Thank you again for your part in the great success of the First Friday Club of Chicago. I look forward to being with each of you, whether in person or virtually, over the course of the next year.



What Just Happened?

"Thelma & Louise" stop by the First Friday Club to discuss events surrounding the November 2020 Election

Only three days had passed since one of our country's

most tumultuous presidential elections in history. Remember, we still didn't know who the actual winner was, as many ballots in a number of states remained uncounted.

Into the breach on Friday, November 6 stepped Carol Marin and Mary Ann Ahern, political reporters for NBC Chicago. Colleagues, friends,

and giants of Chicago journalism, the pair are sometimes also known as Thelma and Louise, a nickname

they were given by Barack Obama's press secretary (and not as a compliment). They appeared live on Zoom with the First Friday Club, moderated by Mike Cahill, to discuss the outcomes of state and national races and to field audience questions. The presentation was presciently titled, "What Just Happened?"

Coincidentally, November 6 was also the day Carol Marin was retiring from NBC Chicago, so the FFC audience was doubly honored by her appearance on her last day of work. In their wide-ranging discussion, Ahern and Marin addressed:

- The defeat of Governor J.B. Pritzker's graduated income tax amendment, which Marin claimed sprang from the public's deep distrust of Illinois politicians, with perhaps a side dish of dislike for Mike Madigan.
- The re-election of controversial State's Attorney Kim Foxx, after getting herself and her office entangled in the Jussie Smollett affair.
- The outcomes of several state Congressional races, such as Sean Casten's reelection, and Jim Oberweis's early claim that he had defeated Lauren Underwood (Underwood ended up winning, however).
- The interesting fact of Fox News being the first network to call Arizona for Biden, bringing much heat down on them from the political right.
- With presidential election still hanging in the balance, Marin said, "I think there is a huge and growing investment on the part of Republicans and Democrats to find a tally and put an end to this.... The whole world is watching."

- A question from Father John Cusick about whether there might be any people willing to stand shoulder to shoulder to address the deep divisions in the country. While Ahern rejected any false optimism and mentioned divisions even in her own family, she said that any progress would come down to individual responsibility to call out lies when they hear lies.
- Several audience-member questions, including "To what extent do you think our national divisions are rooted in racial hostility and resentment?" and another about the trend of some non-Cuban Hispanics turning out for Trump.
- The possibility of new young leadership in Illinois politics. While Marin mentioned

the enduring fraternity house vibe of Springfield, both journalists also noted the presence of smart young legislators, both women and men, waiting for an opportunity to lead.

Ahern paid a touching tribute to her mentor Marin, calling it "the honor of a lifetime to have shared this beat with Carol Marin."

"Oh, stop it!" said Marin with a smile, who said what a privilege it had been to work with her longtime friend.

Faith and Religious Traditions: Will They Be Relevant to Future Generations?

"Less than 50% of Americans are affiliated

with any kind of religious organization ..."

Rabbis Evan and Ari Moffic, married and parents of two children, joined the First Friday Club live via Zoom in April. They shared their insight on the relevance of faith and religious traditions which have been the common thread of worship shared by many religious groups and generations of families.

Addressing this

complex topic, Evan and Ari drew on their extensive work with interfaith families who have been

challenged to find a common denominator between two different religions while keeping their faith and traditions alive.

Rabbi Evan Moffic is the rabbi and spiritual leader of Congregation Solel in Highland Park, Illinois, with a strong commitment to interfaith families. Rabbi Ari Moffic is a rabbi-educator who partners with families to inspire learners of all ages and backgrounds to incorporate Judaism into their lives. Ari is currently the Director of Congregational Learning at Temple Beth-El in Northbrook, Illinois.

When asked what initially sparked an interest with interfaith work, Ari said that while in rabbinic studies, she participated in a wedding ceremony of an interfaith couple, offering them a blessing. As for Evan, while working with two Christian faith communities during his tenure at Chicago Sinai Congregation, he realized the richness and challenges shared by all faith groups.

The couple went on to further discuss the increasingly diverse and secular world in which we live. Change is ever rampant and rapid, impacting our faith lives, families, communities, and houses of worship. Our definitions of faith, religion, and worship have changed, thus reshaping our faith and religious traditions.

For instance, what does it mean today to be religious and spiritual? In the case of those who check the "none" box when asked for their religious affiliation, they attribute themselves as spir-

itual yet not necessarily tied to a particular faith tradition and/or faith community.

However, it's important to note that we are all born with and develop an inner need for connection, community, and meaning in our lives. We want to belong to something larger than ourselves. Which brings us back to why faith traditions in the past have been the answer to this quest. But in an increasingly secular society, our sources go beyond faith and religious traditions.

Discussion continued, with the Moffics providing suggestions to help better understand another person's faith journey, especially when it involves a different religion from your own.

- Explore through the following reading material: Being Both: Embracing Two Religions in One Interfaith Family by Susan Katz Miller (Beacon Press, 2013), a story which provides a benchmark of one family's interfaith journey.
- Face the fear and threat of another religion by exploring another faith tradition on an official online site and/or by attending a study group, worship service, or social/cultural event. Engage in conversation with a member of another faith through interfaith events like First Friday Club, and keep an open mind (the aim is not necessarily to leave your own faith tradition).
- When a family member no longer wants to participate in a faith tradition, engage in conversations by exploring what's at issue. Be open to understanding how the family member is searching for and/or engaging in his own meaning of life and sense of community. Explain the importance and meaning of the rituals/practices of your own faith tradition while remembering that forcing a family member to participate in your traditions usually does not end well.

From the comments received after this presentation, it's clear that more conversation is needed on this topic. The Moffics not only engaged our minds and hearts, but they addressed and made connections between work, faith, values and issues that affect our daily lives and our faith.



Fr. James Martin, S.J. | May 7, 2021



Back to the Future:

How a Visit to the Places Where Jesus Lived, Taught & Prayed Changed Everything

Even though Jesuit Father James Martin was writing a book about Jesus, he didn't really want to go to the Holy

Land. He thought it might be touristy. It might ruin the images in his mind's eye of the Gospel places where Jesus walked.

Boy, was he ever wrong.

Father Martin appeared on Zoom with the First Friday Club on May 7, 2021 to talk about his best selling book, *Jesus: A Pilgrimage*. Moderated by Mike and Cathy O'Connell-Cahill, the Zoom discussion "smashed" the First Friday Club record by attracting more than 500 audience members.

Martin began by describing his quixotic search for the Bay of Parables, where Jesus preached from a boat along the Sea of Galilee. ("Never heard of it!" said many of the people he asked on his first trip to the Holy Land, but Martin was undeterred.) When he finally found it, what did he see? Rocky ground, thorns, and fertile ground. Sound familiar? Right out of Jesus' parable of the sower. This discovery helped Martin realize that oftentimes something we don't "get" in the gospels has a real-life explanation we just don't realize.

"When Jesus was preaching his parables," says Martin, "he was not preaching about things in general, or about theories or concepts, like 'Imagine these people are like rocks,' or 'Imagine these people are like thorns." Instead, Jesus was preaching about things right in front of him. "He probably said, 'Those people are like those thorns right behind you,' and the people turned around.... It grounded Jesus in a way I never could have imagined, and reminded me again how Jesus is fully human and fully divine.... He lived in a particular time and place."

Martin says that for him, the most meaningful place in the Holy Land was the Sea of Galilee: not only for its great beauty but also for the astounding realization that Jesus was actually there, that he saw the same things people see today. He says that many pilgrims tell him that while they knew the gospel stories set near the Sea of Galilee, it had always seemed "like a fairy tale, a mythical place." And then suddenly, there it is, in front of them. "It's kind of shocking, and it takes a while to process it," says Martin. "It's really important to me in a way that I can't really even articulate."

In response to a question about the church's treatment of LGBT Catholics, a topic about which

Martin has often written and spoken, Martin pointed to Jesus' response to the Roman centurion, who comes to ask Jesus to heal his servant. This was a man on the margins, says Martin—not a Jew, he doesn't even believe in God. Yet Jesus "listens to him, encounters him, does a great favor for him, and then he praises his faith." So, says Martin, "this is how Jesus treats people on the margins, with respect and compassion and sensitivity. And this is the way we should be treating people on the margins. So

the gospel stories tell us how we should be treating LGBT people."

"I would never say this about any retreat or anything else, but going to the Holy Land will change your life," says Martin. "When you understand the geography better, you understand the story better.... Someone said to me ... it's like knowing a good friend of yours. You know him well, but you'll know him better when you go to his house where he grew up. You just will."
